Does Hydro have the ability to develop typical load profiles for its customers that might be used,
for example, to manage EV charger demand, high efficiency heat pump demand, etc?

A. The last load research study was completed in 2006 as a joint initiative between Newfoundland and Labrador Hydro ("Hydro") and Newfoundland Power Inc. ("Newfoundland Power"). In Newfoundland Power's 2022/2023 General Rate Application Settlement Agreement, Newfoundland Power agreed to conduct a load research study. The plan for this study was provided to the Board of Commissioners of Public Utilities ("Board") and parties in June 2023 and, according to Newfoundland Power's submission, its consultant will study loads through two winters (2023–2024 and 2024–2025).¹ In the interim, regarding the management of electric vehicle ("EV") charging, Newfoundland Power, with a letter of support from Hydro, submitted an application for an "EV Load Management Pilot Project"² designed to "assess the costeffectiveness of strategies to manage light-duty EV load on the Island Interconnected System," which has since been approved by the Board of Commissioners of Public Utilities.³

While no similar management program exists for heat pumps, Hydro believes high-efficiency cold climate heat pumps will have less of a demand impact at peak grid times than electric resistance heating.
