- Page 137, Allowance for Unforeseen Items. The Allowance for Unforeseen Q. Items for \$750,000 is included in Schedule B listing projects over \$750,000.
 - a) Please explain why Newfoundland Power included this Allowance in Schedule B given the amount for the project is not greater than \$750,000 and whether Newfoundland Power considers this Allowance the same as a capital project over \$750,000.
 - b) Has Newfoundland Power considered increasing the amount of the Allowance? If yes, explain why it has not been increased. If no, explain why it hasn't considered increasing the amount at this time.
 - c) How and in what circumstances in 2024 would Newfoundland Power use the funds available under this Allowance?
 - The compilation of Newfoundland Power's 2024 Capital Budget Application was well underway when the House of Assembly passed amendments to the *Public Utilities* Act and the Electrical Power Control Act, 1994. Regulation 40/23, issued under the recently amended *Public Utilities Act*, states that prior approval of the Board is required where a capital expenditure exceeds \$750,000. Newfoundland Power recognizes that the current Allowance for Unforeseen Items does not exceed \$750,000.

Schedule B of the Company's 2024 Capital Budget Application includes items for which the Board's approval is required. The Board's Provisional Guidelines require the Company to obtain the Board's approval for an allowance for unforeseen items.² The Company included the Allowance for Unforeseen Items in Schedule B for approval as a result of this requirement.

Newfoundland Power did not consider increasing the amount of the *Allowance for Unforeseen Items* for the 2024 Capital Budget Application.

The Company has sought approval for \$750,000 for an *Allowance for Unforeseen Items* since the *2000 Capital Budget Application*. The requirement to seek approval for an allowance for unforeseen items was included in the 2007 Capital Budget Application Guidelines, and is also now required in the Provisional Guidelines. Given the Company's recent experience with the allowance, there was no basis upon which to seek an increase in the amount. In addition, given the timing of the release of new legislation by the Provincial Government and the provisional nature of the Capital Budget Application Guidelines, the Company maintained the dollar amount of the Allowance for Unforeseen Items in Newfoundland Power's 2024 Capital Budget Application.

Alignment of the Provisional Guidelines with the amended *Public Utilities Act* and the new Regulation 40/23 might afford the Company an opportunity to review the

amount of the *Allowance for Unforeseen Items* and determine if an increase to the amount would be required.³

c) The purpose of the *Allowance for Unforeseen Items* is to permit the utility to act expeditiously to deal with events affecting the electrical system which cannot wait for the specific approval of the Board, and should only be used for expenditures which are so urgent that any delay would have serious negative consequences.⁴

Newfoundland Power expects that should circumstances arise requiring use of the *Allowance for Unforeseen Items* in 2024, it would align with the description outlined above.

Newfoundland Power has previously used the *Allowance for Unforeseen Items* for significant weather events, and incidents which posed serious risks to the electrical system and/or safety of employees or the general public. For example, in 2010 the *Allowance for Unforeseen Items* was used three times to deal with events affecting the electrical system. The allowance was used to address generation, transmission and distribution infrastructure that was damaged following Hurricane Igor.⁵ The Company filed a supplemental application on November 30th, 2010 for an additional \$1,900,000 supplementary allowance to the *Allowance for Unforeseen Items*.⁶ Newfoundland Power filed a supplemental capital budget application in 2011 to address the remaining work at the Lawn and Port Union hydro plants that was not so urgent it needed to be completed under the *Allowance for Unforeseen Items*.⁷

In Newfoundland Power's *2000 Capital Budget Application* it was determined that an allowance of \$750,000 was sufficient to allow the Company to act expeditiously to deal with events affecting the electrical system which cannot wait for the specific approval of the Board. As there has been significant cost increases over the past 25 years, it is likely a review of the amount of the *Allowance for Unforeseen Items* will result in a requested increase in subsequent capital budget applications.
